Dear Friends.

The Jewish Festival of the Passover and the Christian Festival of Easter always occur close in time, although they can sometimes happen as much as a month apart. This makes sense since Jesus was in Jerusalem at Passover time when he was arrested, crucified, buried, and raised from the dead. This year, Passover and Holy Week overlap exactly, with Passover beginning on Saturday, March 27 and running through Sunday, April 4, and Holy Week beginning on Palm Sunday, March 28 and running through Easter Sunday, April 4.

As we gather at the Lord's Table for communion on Good Friday night and Easter morning, we remember Jesus sharing the bread and cup with his disciples as they celebrated the Passover meal. Jewish believers today still observe the ritual of the Seder meal, in which they act out the story of Passover. It is a celebration of God liberating his people from slavery in Egypt and from under the oppression of the Pharaoh. As the meal is shared around the table, the story is told. But it's not just ancient history that is shared; it is told in the first person. The children are taught and the adults are reminded, "We commemorate Passover tonight because of what God did for us when we went out of Egypt" (even if the story is being told in April 2021).

As Jesus sat at the table with his disciples and celebrated the Passover, "he took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to them, saying, 'This is my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me." (Luke 22:19) And so we remember Jesus' death during Holy Week. But we also celebrate his victory over sin

and death through his resurrection. This is why the two men dressed in dazzling clothes in the tomb say to the scared women, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here, but has risen." (Luke 24:5) Even though we remember Jesus every time we break bread and drink from the cup, the Lord's Supper is not a memorial meal honoring a dead hero from the past. When we gather around the Lord's table, we remember what Jesus did for us during the Passover celebration 2,000 years ago and we include ourselves in the story. We might say, "We commemorate Easter because of what God did for us when he raised Jesus from the dead." We enjoy communion with one another and with our risen, living Lord Jesus Christ.

The 20th century Spanish philosopher George Santayana is credited with the saying, "Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it." As Easter people, we are called to remember what God has done in the past. In God's past with God's people, including us, we find our hope for the future. If anything, Easter is a celebration of the amazing new thing God has done in the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. However, God's new thing is not just a thing of the past. In fact, the power of Christ's resurrection is always breaking into our lives and guiding us. It is true that at Easter we remember the past so we can live into God's future.

Happy Easter!
Christ is risen!
He is risen, indeed!

MUSIC POLICIES UPDATED

The session has approved the following music policies as recommended by the Worship & Music Ministry Team. These policies are contained in our church's Manual of Operations.

MUSIC POLICIES

Music may serve as presentation and interpretation of Scripture, as response to the gospel, and as prayer, through psalms and canticles, hymns and anthems, spirituals and spiritual songs. (Book of Order, W3.0203; W-3-0304).

Music plays a vital role in worship at the Wallace Presbyterian Church. We use vocal and instrumental music to pray together, to offer corporate praise to God, to give thanks to God, to grow in the Christian faith, and to proclaim God's Word. Music in WPC worship is meant to encourage the congregation to participate in worship. Whether we are listening to preludes played on the organ or piano, anthems sung by the choir, offertories rung by handbells, or larger musical works accompanied by instruments, WPC musicians offer their gifts in ways that nurture and inspire a listening congregation.

- 1. All music at Wallace Presbyterian Church is selected in consultation with the Music Director and the Organist.
- 2. As technology and digital capabilities grow, WPC continues to encourage live accompaniment for choirs, vocalists, and instrumentalists. When an accompanist is providing service music, he/she will accompany the congregation, the choir, instrumentalists, or guest musicians.
- 3. In extenuating circumstances (e.g., both the Music Director and Organist are unavailable, COVID-19 pandemic, etc.) the following types of recorded music are acceptable for a worship service:
- A recorded instrumental accompaniment for the choir, smaller group of singers, or soloist (e.g., anthem, special music)
- A previously taped recording (audio or video) of the choir, smaller group, or soloist singing
- A purchased recorded accompaniment for the choirs (if necessary, e.g., cantata, children's musical, VBS music)



As a result of Zoom conversations with my Presbyterian pastor colleagues, I have been thinking about the Pastoral Prayer in worship, especially since our services are live streamed, reach a much larger audience than previously, and are available to anyone and everyone to watch.

My policy has always been (as much as possible) to ask permission from someone before sharing prayer concerns with the congregation, either in a congregational email or in public worship.

My pastor colleagues have suggested that prayer concerns in public worship, especially in live stream services that are widely available, be limited to names. I think this is wise advice, even with an individual's permission.

In consultation with the session, I will follow this procedure for the weekly pastoral prayer in worship:

- 1. I will send a weekly email to the congregation at the end of the week that includes prayer requests with information (e.g., upcoming surgeries, treatments, deaths, recoveries, etc.).
- 2. In the introduction to the pastoral prayer each week, I will refer people to the weekly email if they want specific prayer request information. If someone is not on the church email list, he/she can contact Cheryl and be placed in the email group.
- 3. In the weekly Pastoral Prayer, we will pray for people by name only, trusting God to know and care for their specific needs). There will also be a time provided for the congregation to offer the prayers, concerns, and joy of their hearts and lives to God.
