Dear Friends,

In Vacation Bible School. Sunday School, on a retreat, or at a youth fellowship meeting, have you ever sung, or taught someone to sing, the Avery & Marsh song "We Are the Church"? The refrain goes like this: "I am the church! You are the church! We are the church together! All who follow Jesus. all around the world! Yes, we're the church together!" Although the song was published in 1972, the first verse could well be describing the church today in the midst of the coronavirus pandemic: "The church is not a building, the church is not a steeple, the church is not a resting place, the church is a people." Since the beginning of March, my e-mail inbox and Facebook page have been flooded with messages, articles, links, and musings about what it means to be the church together when we are forced to be apart by a virus over which we have no control (other than separating ourselves). I've also received many church cartoons dealing with the effects of the coronavirus on church life. One of my favorites is by Dave Walker. a freelance cartoonist who lives near London. He draws church and cycling

cartoons. In this particular cartoon, a church that looks remarkably like the Wallace Presbyterian Church appears empty. The doors are closed and no one is on the church grounds. The church sign, however, sends a different message: "The building is closed. The church is open."

And so it is, wherever you are, and wherever Christians are scattered throughout the world. It has been an interesting experience leading worship since March 29 in the absence of our regular congregation. For the first couple of Sundays, I found myself feeling rather melancholy as I looked at the empty pews as Karla and Vera played their beautiful music. More recently, however, while I miss every one of you on Sunday morning and eagerly anticipate the day when we can all gather for worship as "the church together," I am grateful and heartened knowing that, despite our physical separation, we are united in our worship.

All of us wonder when or if things will ever get back to normal? The elders and I are working on a plan for "re-entry," whenever that takes place. Aside from the concerns about health and safety, continued social distancing, and other pragmatic issues, this seems like a perfect time for us to take a good look at how "we are the church together." As in any emergency or disaster, weaknesses and needs get revealed. We can evaluate what we've learned from our forced separation as a congregation and work to strengthen our common


