SUNDAY, OCTOBER 4

We will celebrate the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper during worship on World Communion Sunday, October 4.

Worshipers in the sanctuary will be given individual, pre-filled communion cups and bread. Worshipers at home are encouraged to prepare the elements of bread and cup. We will partake of the elements together as a congregation and with believers around the world.

World Communion Sunday (originally called World Wide Communion Sunday) is a gift of the Presbyterian Church to the larger ecumenical church. The first celebration occurred at Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, PA, in 1933 where Dr. Hugh Thompson Kerr served as pastor.

Celebration of World Wide Communion Sunday was adopted as a denominational practice in the Presbyterian Church (US) in 1936. Churches in other denominations were invited to celebrate with us from the beginning, but it wasn't until 1940 when the Department of Evangelism of the Federal Council of Churches (a predecessor body of the National Council of Churches) promoted extending the celebration to a number of churches around the world that the practice became widespread.

All are welcome at the Lord's table!



Dear Friends.

At our September session meeting, our elders and I read Psalm 13 which is a psalm of lament. The psalmist honestly pours out his feelings to his God when he says, "How long, O Lord? Will you forget me forever? How long will you hide your face from me? How long must I bear pain in my soul, and have sorrow in my heart all day long?"

Seven months into the Covid-19 pandemic, more and more I hear folks expressing these same feelings. In the midst of restrictions, cancellations, uncertainties, illness, and fears for the future, we may share the psalmist's lament, "How long must I bear pain in my soul, and have sorrow in my heart all day long?"

Here's the thing about the psalms of lament, however. These songs of pain and sorrow and suffering and lament are painfully honest, but they typically end with a doxology or giving praise to the very God to whom the psalmist has been lamenting. Psalm 13 ends with these words. "But I trusted in your steadfast love; my heart shall rejoice in your salvation. I will sing to the Lord, because he has dealt bountifully with me."

After we read Psalm 13. our elders and I read and discussed an article by Julie Raffety from The Presbyterian Outlook called "Creative ministry during pandemic grief." Her thoughts reminded me of a psalm of lament, as she rightfully identified the sorrow and grief the people of God are experiencing in the midst of this pandemic that has disrupted all of life and our church life. Here are some sentences that jumped out at me: "We cannot do things the way we've always done them and still remain safe throughout this pandemic. However, I believe the church is still called to minister in this pandemic, in this time in history. So, we have to find creative ways to worship, to serve, to gather, to pray, to celebrate, to mourn, to baptize, to share the gospel. We have to find creative ways to do this essential work of following Jesus. It cannot look the same as last year."

As challenging as her words and the Covid-19 situation are, I think Julie Raffety is exactly right. If we wait until "things are back to normal" or if we try to do things "the way we've always done them," we miss the opportunity to minister in this moment that cries out for a word of hope, a vision of promise, and the reality of service.

Our elders and I discussed how we can best engage our congregation in mission and ministry during this pandemic. We also started thinking about needs we can address in our congregation and community that are the result of the

Zoom invitations are sent by email on Mondays.


